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## THE EVENT



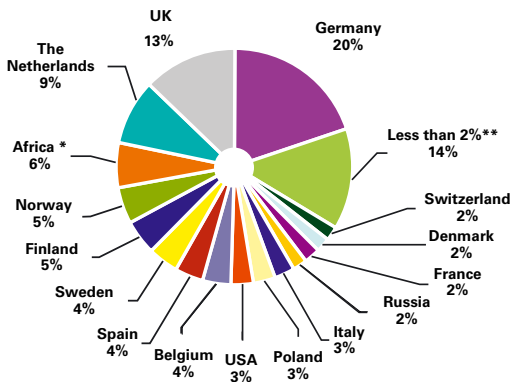

## PARTICIPATION STATISTICS

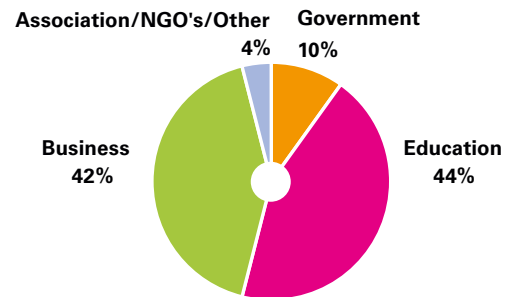

## CONFERENCE PROGRAMME

The programme for ONLINE EDUCA BERLIN 2006 was a rich mix of formats, ranging from plenary sessions featuring many well-known and thought-provoking keynote speakers to intense, highly interactive discussion sessions. This year, a total of **506 speakers and chairpeople from 45 countries** were involved, making it the most extensive programme yet. The agenda was created through a selection process involving both a public call for proposals and a thorough investigation of the international e-learning sector to identify and invite leading experts and representatives.



The main conference schedule, created with the support of the Steering and Advisory Committees, included **four plenary sessions** and **eighty-four parallel sessions** broadly focussed on the main themes. In addition, on the two days prior to the conference, **twenty full-day or half-day workshops** and **four pre-conference events** were held: the **E-Learning in the Automotive Industry Sector Forum**, the **Virtual Mobility Forum**, the **2<sup>nd</sup> E-Learning for Defence & Security Forum** and the **Lifelong Learning Forum**.

This was my first time at Online Educa Berlin – I did not know it is such a high-level conference with such a large international audience. Very good.

**Opening Plenary** speakers on Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> included **David Siele**, Director of Higher Education from Kenya's Ministry of Education, **George Siemens**, the well-known Canadian e-learning expert and President of Complexive Systems Inc., **Jean-Michel Billaut** from BNP Paribas, France and **Roger Larsen**, Founder and Managing Director of Fronter, Norway.

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Thursday ended with a lively and highly provocative plenary session entitled **Future Perspectives**, which provided a platform for several experts to plot the future e-learning landscape from their own particular perspective. Key-note speakers taking part were **Dr. Peter Scott**, from the Centre for New Media, Knowledge Media Institute, Open University, UK, **Monika Weber-Fahr**, World Bank Institute, USA, **Rich Caccavale**, Blackboard, USA and **Nick Nunnington**, Centre for Excellence in Teaching and Learning (CETL), Sheffield Hallam University, UK.



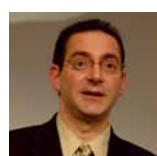
Friday began with two very different but very well attended plenary sessions. The first offered an excellent opportunity to get up to speed on the topic of **Informal Learning**. Speakers included **Jay Cross**, Internet Time Group, USA, **Dr. Yael Ravin**, IBM's Center for Advanced Learning, USA, **Kevin Wheeler**, Global Learning Resources, Inc. USA, and **Mike McKeown**, Manager, Education Business Development, Cisco Systems, UK.



The second plenary session on Friday morning tackled the somewhat thorny issue of **Strengthening the Links between Practitioners and Researchers** in the field of e-learning. Taking part were **Dr. Leonard A. Plugge**, Scientific Technical Council, SURF, The Netherlands, **Dr. Nicolas Balacheff**, Kaleidoscope NoE/ CNRS Director Laboratoire Leibniz-IMAG, France, and **Prof. Alan Brown** and **Dr. Jenny Bimrose**, Institute for Employment Research, University of Warwick, UK.



Of course coming to ONLINE EDUCA BERLIN is not only about attending formal programme sessions; it is also a unique networking opportunity. More than ever in 2006, participants' feedback clearly articulated the importance of networking and the appreciation felt for the special sessions and programme time devoted to fostering it. These include the ever-popular **Speed Networking Session**, the **Special Interest Group Lunches**, and the extremely popular **Online Educa Party**, held this year on site and which attracted over 500 buoyant revellers who danced and socialized till late on Thursday night.





## CONFERENCE PROGRAMME

The main conference agenda was organised around this year's conference themes and attracted a very large cross-section of the e-learning community.

As well as events directly linked to these themes, the agenda also included several special-focus sessions. These included one on **Semantic Nets**, led by Michael Härtel from Germany's Federal Institute for Vocational Training (BIBB). Another, organised by Fronter, dealt with **Learning Platforms as Strategic Campus-Wide Solutions**. Michael L. Brown, from SkillsNET Enterprises Ltds., USA organised a meeting that examined the development of a **Skills and Competency Open Source Framework**. SURF and JISC cooperated to organise a session on **Access and Identity Management**, and Maja Pivec from FH Joanneum in Austria convened a group that looked into **the Role of Game-Based Learning**. Finally, a session on **School Transformation** organized by IBM.

Two specific regions were also featured in the 2006 agenda: **Japan**, where the session was led by Prof. Toshio Kobayashi from NIME, and a look at **Russia**, led by Viktor Bolotov from the country's Federal Service on Supervision in Education and Science.

## THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMME IN SUMMARY

This year's agenda offered a wide variety of topics, and it is clear from participants' feedback that the sessions they attended were greatly appreciated. This was due not only to the quality of the input from speakers and panellists but also to the richness and pertinence of the discussions.

Based on feedback and looking at attendance figures for individual events, it is clear that all sessions dealing with **Web 2.0 Technologies** were hugely popular. These included presentations about the **adoption of social software for learning purposes**, like that by Sarah Guth, who is using **Wikis and Blogs** to teach English at the University of Padua in Italy. An overflow audience also listened intently to information regarding a survey introduced by Kai Heddergott on how German companies are using **Social Software** to radically change learning in the workplace. In another extremely well-attended meeting, Teemu Arina from Finland highlighted the way in which blogs can be used to support **informal learning through reflective practice**.

A full conference track was dedicated to the theme of **Game-Based Learning and Simulations**, and practically every session in this track took place before a packed audience. The session featuring examples of gaming applications was particularly popular and provided hands-on experience for participants,



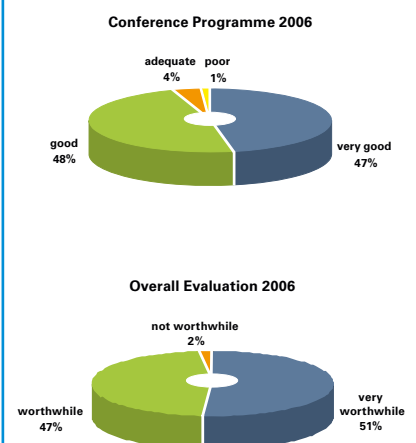
as they had a chance to meet developers of, for example, the **Pax Warrior Simulation, AnimalClass, and ABW's Business Games**. Presenters such as Euan Mackenzie from 3MRT in the UK highlighted the way in which games can be used to **re-engage the lost digital native**, while Nathan Kracklauer from Enspire Learning in the US described the application of **gaming in the management of virtual corporate teams**.

Interest in **Informal Learning** continues to be high. Building on the content of Friday's plenary on the subject, several examples of **Informal and Lifelong Learning at the Workplace** in companies such as Cisco, Energie AG in Austria, Nestlé, and Banque Cantonale Vaudoise in Switzerland offered practical experience and expert advice from training managers and instructional designers. The theme of Lifelong Learning was complemented by several sessions on **ePortfolios**. These featured examples not only of ePortfolio initiatives like those described by Shane Sutherland in the UK covering **primary school through to professional learning** but also national approaches such as the **e-Framework concept** based on **Domain, Process and Service Models** being launched in the Netherlands and the UK.

The **Impact of ICT in Schools** featured strongly on the agenda this year, clearly indicating conference participants' increasing interest in this sector. The session on **Virtual Learning Environments** dedicated to school communities in different parts of Europe and the USA showed the way in which these developments can lead to **new pedagogical approaches in the classroom**. This theme continued with sessions dedicated to showcasing innovative practice like the use of **podcasting** in Edinburgh schools, **professional development circles** for teachers in Turkey, and the provision of online science resources for Welsh secondary-level students. The debate about a potential digital divide in this sector led by Wilfried Hendricks entitled **Mind the Digital Gap!** attracted a great deal of discussion from the audience made up of teachers, ministry representatives, and parents.

New ways of handling **Online Learning Content** continued to attract attention and sessions dedicated to this topic included presentations of leading-edge developments such as **OpenLearn** recently launched by the UK Open University. They also highlighted important trend-mapping work like the OLCOS roadmapping 2012 project, which describes the further development of **Open Educational Practices and Resources**.

## THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMME IN SUMMARY

But of course available content is only one part of the story. Well-trained **online tutors and support staff** are also important, and sessions featuring real examples of how to create and support **sustainable opportunities for online interaction** such as those presented by Karen Thomas from South Africa and Jana Vejvodová in the Czech Republic were highly appreciated for their honest portrayal of this challenging task. **Tips and suggestions for improving and boosting the achievements of online education** provided by leading experts such as Wim Westera from the Dutch Open University was the highlight for some conference participants. For others it was the **Lean E-Learning Approach and Toolkit** being rolled out for European SMEs and described by Liam Brown from the University of Limerick in Ireland that proved to be the most valuable part of the agenda.

As always, the agenda provided plenty of opportunities to acquire knowledge about online courses and services aimed at **workers and professionals**. Participants expressed appreciation for the Management of Crisis course aimed at **Norwegian emergency service** personnel, the **Driveline** course on project management developed for workers in the **automotive supplier ZF**, and the e-learning courses developed for **Ford in Turkey**.

Finally, the topic of **E-Learning in Higher Education** attracted significant numbers of participants with plenty of examples of take-up from around the world, including New Zealand and Japan. This topic included intensive discussion about the challenges of **institutionalising online learning** and **sustainable virtual campus services** in collaborative structures, such as the Spanish G9 Group of Universities and the Swiss Virtual Campus. Participants also actively engaged in discussions about how student experiences can be broadened by offering **Virtual Mobility schemes** and the potential impact of Digital Campus Frameworks, as well as the integration of **Bachelor and Executive Education**.

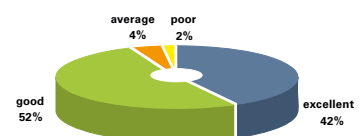

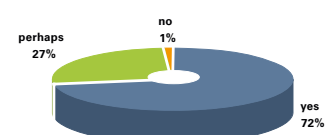
